It's seems now it's "Game On" that there might be a call for privatization of the VA Healthcare System. Personally, I feel this is a very dangerous move.

I see this as a dangerous move having been digging and investigating for many years now how best to save money and put those savings into medical care and benefits and the VA has the strongest buying power over any other medical institution in the country, but, they're really not taking advantage of this.

Moving toward privatization will more than double costs, and if you recall the Choice Card, well it's still a fiasco but thousands of Veterans wanted it, and all it did was make matters worse for many. So privatizing the VA will do exactly the same thing, make matters worse, but if you don't want to believe me, that's ok, we can simply wait and see.

Three years ago when I proposed a method to not only exchange out old and outdated medical equipment and save money, and to take advantage of the buying power the VA has but doesn't use to several hundred members of Congress, I did get some really good feed back, but.. not near enough to see anyone take action.

And while I continue to work with one Senator and his staff on computerization of the Veterans Benefits Claims system, putting the two together would drastically improve over all services, provided Congress can actually produce legislation that is BULLET PROOF, meaning no loopholes on how to address the problems within the employment of staff for the VA Facilities and not wimping out should the POTUS decide to veto the bill.

Then we have Phoenix VA Director Susan Helman who managed to skate charges of tampering with Patient Wait Lists but was allowed to plea bargain down to accepting "gifts" and retain her job back in the news claiming violation of constitutional rights.

I wonder, did I miss something in school where the constitution allows or covers employment other than discrimination?

U.S. Attorney General Loretta Lynch said Tuesday that the law fast-tracking firings is unconstitutional because VA employees cannot appeal a final decision by an administrative judge.

Lawmakers have become increasingly frustrated with what they see as the VA's inability to fire poor managers. New legislation has been working through the House and Senate, though there is no agreement yet between the two chambers on how much power to give the department in dealing with such cases.

Might I suggest a very strongly worded, legal and binding morals clause in an employment contract? Leaving no room for doubt and all decisions final?

The Senate Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs has headed the investigation on the facility, which has been called "Candy Land" by some Veterans because doctors there were said to easily prescribe painkillers. This report is a follow up to one conducted in 2014 by the U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs, which found that over-prescribing painkillers may have led to three deaths.

Interesting though in the process of their investigation, the offenders were allowed to keep their jobs, and from inside sources many staff had been watching, monitoring and attempted to report violations and they all went ignored and this had been going on for at least the past two years.

What does it take to rid the VA of uncaring, uncompassionate staff and staff who would normally be held responsible for the death(s) of anyone?

Where is Secretary McDonald today? He couldn't come up with another off the wall comparison like he did with the VA and Disneyland?

House Votes to Let VA Doctors Recommend Marijuana

Last week, the House endorsed a proposal which would allow VA doctors to discuss the use of medical marijuana with patients. The measure by Rep. Earl Blumenauer (D-Ore.) had been offered previously as an amendment to an annual spending bill for the VA and military construction projects without success, but this time it passed on a 233-189 vote. Currently 24 states, along with the District of Columbia, have passed laws allowing access to medical marijuana to treat conditions including anxiety and traumatic brain injury. Fourteen of those states authorize doctors to recommend medical marijuana to treat post-traumatic stress disorder. "I think it is the right thing to do for our veterans, to be able to treat them equitably, to enable them to have access to the doctor who knows them the best, giving them better treatment and saving them money," said Blumenauer.

VA and Leanin.org Partnership Seeks to Empower Women Veterans

WASHINGTON – The Department of Veterans Affairs' (VA) Center for Women Veterans today announced a partnership with LeanIn.Org, the nonprofit organization founded by Facebook Chief Operating Officer, Sheryl Sandberg, to empower women to achieve their ambitions. Building on the successful launch of <u>LeanIn.Org circles</u> within the Department of Defense, VA is following the same model to increase support to women Veterans.

The VA initiative is called the LeanIn.Org <u>Women Veterans' chapter</u>. The Women Veterans Chapter is comprised of two distinct pilot programs: the Veteran-to-Veteran program, a virtual program, which allows any woman Veteran to participate, no matter where she is located; meetings will be moderated and attended by women Veterans throughout the United States. The second is a face-to-face pilot circle. The face-to-face program is created in partnership with the existing LeanIn.Org chapter in Seattle, WA. This circle is an innovative hybrid of women Veterans and non-military members providing an environment for both to learn and share leadership skills.

"We are thrilled to have LeanIn.Org as our collaborative partner," said Kayla M. Williams, Director of VA's Center for Women Veterans. "For many years, women Veterans have expressed to us that they need to have a mechanism to engage with their fellow women Veterans to make a difference in their community and we believe this is the perfect match. VA is pleased to be a part of these two pilot programs."

"Women are the fastest growing population of our nation's Veterans and through this Circles program, these women will have the peer support and community they need to reach their goals," said Ashley Finch, LeanIn.Org, Head of Partnerships. "Leanin.Org is proud to be a part of this groundbreaking and important initiative."

Support Agent Orange Reform in House Spending Bill

The House approved an amendment to the House version of the Military Construction and Veterans Affairs appropriations bill (H.R. 4974) that would extend presumptive service connection for conditions associated with exposure to Agent Orange herbicide by Blue Water Navy Vietnam veterans. The House approved the bill.

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) currently presumes any service member who had boots on the ground or served on Vietnam's inland waterways was exposed to Agent Orange. If these veterans experience health problems related to that exposure, they are eligible for VA disability benefits. The policy, however, denies this presumption to veterans who served off the coast of the Republic of Vietnam, even though many of these so-called "Blue Water Navy" veterans are experiencing the same health problems as those who served inland.

The passage of this amendment, sponsored by Rep. Chris Gibson (NY) is a major step forward for Blue Water Navy veterans, who should be eligible for presumptive exposure to Agent Orange. The Senate has passed its version of the Military Construction/Veterans Affairs Appropriations (spending) bill, without this provision. There will be a conference committee appointed to resolve the differences between the two bills. Members are strongly urged to use the FRA Action Center to ask their Senators to support this House provision in the final version of the bill that will be voted on by both chambers and if approved sent to the President to be signed into law or vetoed.

Some Vietnam Navy veterans who never saw action on the ground say they deserve Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) benefits for exposure to Agent Orange. Many of these veterans support the Vietnam Veterans Act, which is being pushed by a grassroots group of veteran volunteers called the Military Veterans Advocacy. The Act would compensate Navy veterans who say they were exposed as plumes of spray containing Agent Orange were washed over ships at sea. On April 28, 2016, U.S. Senators Johnny Isakson, R-Ga., and Richard Blumenthal, D-Conn., chairman and ranking member of the Senate Committee on Veterans' Affairs, respectively, announced the *Veterans First Act* (S.2981) to begin to change the culture at the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). The U.S. Senate Committee on Veterans' Affairs approved the *Veterans First Act* by unanimous vote. Read the text of the bill. The bill includes accountability measures to give the VA the tools to fire bad actors, to prohibit bonuses for employees accused of wrongdoing and to institute protections for whistleblowers.

Senate to Tackle NDAA This Week

This week the Senate returns from its Memorial Day break and the Armed Services Committee begins deliberations on its' version of the National Defense Authorization Act.

Already SASC Chairman, Sen. John McCain (R-AZ) has made it known that he will be including an extra \$17-18 billion dollars in the basic allotment. He said the House version of the bill, which takes \$18 billion from the account for Overseas Contingency Operations is not the way to go.

The extra money will allow a full, according to present law, pay increase for those on active duty and will help cover the costs of additional equipment that the services need.

NAUS has also learned that Senate Minority Leader Harry Reid (D-NV) is offering four separate amendments to either start movement on full Concurrent Receipt of both retired pay and VA disability pay or fully eliminate the disparity. His amendments include lowering the percentage of disability to 40%, inclusion of all who have at least 10% or more and two others, which would be greatly appreciated by those who have their disability pay taken from their retired pay.

VA Secretary Provides Relief for Veterans with Traumatic Brain Injuries

WASHINGTON – Secretary of Veterans Affairs Robert McDonald has granted equitable relief to more than 24,000 Veterans following a national review of Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) medical examinations conducted in connection with disability compensation claims processed between 2007 and 2015.

This action by the Secretary allows the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to offer new TBI examinations to Veterans whose initial examination for TBI was not conducted by one of four designated medical specialists and provides them with the opportunity to have their claims reprocessed. Equitable relief is a unique legal remedy that allows the Secretary to correct an injustice to a claimant where VA is not otherwise authorized to do so within the scope of the law.

"Traumatic Brain Injury is a signature injury in Veterans returning from the conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan, and VA is proud to be an organization that sets the bar high for supporting these, and all, Veterans," said Secretary McDonald. "Providing support for Veterans suffering from a TBI is a priority and a privilege, and we must make certain they receive a just and fair rating for their disabilities."

To ensure that TBI is properly evaluated for disability compensation purposes, VA developed a policy in 2007 requiring that one of four specialists – a psychiatrist, physiatrist, neurosurgeon or neurologist – complete TBI exams when VA does not have a prior diagnosis.

Since 2007, medicine around TBI has been a rapidly evolving science. VA designated particular specialists to conduct initial TBI exams because they have the most experience with the symptoms and effects of TBI. As more research became available, VA issued a number of guidance documents that may have created confusion regarding the policy. VA has confirmed that its TBI policy guidance is now clear and being followed.

"We let these Veterans down," Secretary McDonald said. "That is why we are taking every step necessary to grant equitable relief to those affected to ensure they receive the full benefits to which they are entitled."

VA understands the importance of an accurate exam to support Veterans' disability claims. The Secretary's decision to grant relief will enable VA to take action on any new examinations without requiring Veterans to submit new claims. If additional benefits are due, VA will award an effective date as early as the date of the initial TBI claim.

VA will contact Veterans identified as part of this national TBI review to offer them an opportunity to receive a new examination and have their claims reprocessed. More than 13,000 of these affected Veterans are already receiving service-connected compensation benefits for TBI at a 10-percent disability evaluation or higher, which means that the diagnosis has already been established.
