Most times the spouse and children walk away with no harm, no foul, but when they are exposed to contaminated water on military bases or many of the hundreds of chemicals on a military base the spouse and children are at high risk of exposure.

Even since the bill passed for Water Contamination at Camp

LeJeune dependents have all but been forgotten and even with that piece of legislation it's super difficult to get approved on any claim.

Almost three years ago I was diagnosed with Squamous Cell cancer, underwent surgery and a year later was told I was cancer free. Sad to say it's back again and all the treatments start over again.

Both my mother and sister were diagnosed with a different form of cancer, but thankfully both have been cancer free for ten plus years now.

MCAS EI Toro was closed and sold off as one of the most badly contaminated bases in the country, and our being so close to that base (where dad retired) I often wonder when and how many civilians will become sick from living on that land as it was never "cleaned-up!" But, I'm sure in time we will start seeing clusters of cancers coming from there.

I still haven't seen or heard of many cases or claims coming from those who served at MCAS Cherry Point yet, but that doesn't mean they don't exist.

I do know word has come out that the VA is covering two areas of point for Squamous Cell, but I sincerely wished they'd have given it a blanket coverage, in my case was two entirely different areas, neither were what the VA has said it would cover. I truly hope now one ever gets it, but be on the look out for unusual growths and see your doctor right away for a biopsy to find out.



- Withdrawing from family and friends

The presence of the following signs requires immediate attention:

- Thinking about hurting or killing themselves
- Looking for ways to kill themselves
- Talking about death, dying or suicide
- Self-destructive behavior such as drug abuse



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Congress Passes Government Funding Legislation with Veteran Provisions

The House and Senate passed a government funding omnibus package that includes 12 appropriations bills for fiscal year 2022, supplemental funding to support Ukraine, and three VFW-supported provisions that would affect Veterans. The first provision would increase the maximum rate of basic pay for VA nurses and physician assistants, allowing VA to offer more competitive salaries. The second provision would permit VA's National Cemetery Administration to grant individual states the ability to decide who is interred in their state Veterans cemeteries and to open their application process, ensuring all National Guard and Reserve members can be buried with fellow service members. The third provision would increase funding for VET TEC from \$45 million to \$125 million to meet the high demand for the program and enable its operation through the end of the fiscal year. The bill now heads to the president for signature. Read more.

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Public Service Loan Forgiveness Waiver

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Department of Education is offering a limited-time waiver to allow borrowers to receive credit for past periods of repayment on loans that would otherwise not qualify for PSLF. The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency announced three burial updates and two new identifications for service members who have been missing and unaccounted-for from World War II. Returning home for burial with full military honors are:

Army Air Forces Pfc. Edward H. Benson Jr., 22, of Roanoke, Virginia, was assigned to the 1562nd Army Air Force Base Unit on Biak Island, part of the modern-day Republic of Indonesia. On March 22, 1945, Benson and 39 other service members were killed during a Japanese air raid of Sorido Airstrip. Three individuals, including Benson, could not be identified or accounted for after the attack. He will be buried on May 14, 2022, in his hometown. Read about Benson.

Navy Water Tender 1st Class Oliver K. Burger, 26, of San Pedro, California, was assigned to the battleship USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft on Dec. 7, 1941. The USS Oklahoma sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Burger. He will be buried on Aug. 31, 2022, at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific (Punchbowl) in Honolulu. Read about Burger.

Army Pvt. Edward M. Ryan, 33, of New York City, was a member of Headquarters Company, 1st Battalion, 105th Infantry Regiment, 27th Infantry Division, which occupied defensive positions along the northwest coast of Saipan as part of a larger operation to secure the Mariana Islands. On July 7, 1944, the commanding general of the Japanese forces ordered a mass suicide charge of his remaining soldiers into the 105th's line. Ryan was killed during the attack, and posthumously awarded the Bronze Star. Following the war, his remains were declared non-recoverable. He will be buried at Arlington National Cemetery in Arlington, Virginia, on a date yet to be determined. Read about Ryan.

Army Staff Sgt. Casimir P. Lobacz, 25, was assigned to Company E, 11th Infantry Regiment, 5th Infantry Division. On Sept. 27, 1944, Lobacz's unit was part of the ground attack on Fort Driant near Metz, France. He was reported to have been killed during the first wave of the assault and his body was unable to be recovered. Read about Lobacz.

Army Air Forces 1st Lt. Newell F. Mills Jr., 21, was assigned to the 354th Fighter Squadron, 355th Fighter Group. On April 7, 1945, Mills was piloting a P-51D Mustang fighter escorting a formation of B-24 Liberator bombers to a target in Geesthacht, Germany. When the formation encountered German fighters near Bremen, he and the other escort pilots engaged the Germans. Following the mission, Mills and his wingman never returned to base or were reported as prisoners of war. The War Department issued an administrative Finding of Death on April 8, 1946. Read about Mills.





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
