

The picture above shows what the POL herbicide spray rig looked like. The pictures below show what the equipment looked like that Sgt. Foster wore while spraying herbicides at all the POL locations on and off base. I felt sorry for him because it was so hot and humid on Guam, and he had to breathe the fumes all the time. About half the time when I would see him he would have a driver helping him. He would sometimes ride on the spray tank and sometimes he would walk while he was spraying. When he was by himself he would drive while spraying from the cab. Sometimes he would stop the truck and get out to spray larger areas.
