Agent Orange Town Hall Meeting a Success

n April 18, the long-awaited Agent Orange Town Hall meeting took place at the American House East 1 facility on Common Road. Several members began showing up at 10 a.m. to start getting things arranged for the presentations. American House provided us with their main dining room, capable of holding around 200 people, along with some of the necessary sound and visual equipment that we needed.

The meeting was scheduled to begin at noon, and at about 11:30 the turnout was pretty sparse. However, as the magic hour approached, people began flooding in at a good clip. We had a signup sheet by the entry door, and the final tally was 130 people, including 84 veterans. We know that several people got by the entrance without signing in, so it's safe to assume we had about 150 people show up. It is encouraging to note that a lot of the people were not veterans, meaning that the advertisement we ran in *The Macomb Daily* attracted more folks than just the veteran community.

Steve Bago put together an excellent panel of speakers, all of whom brought a slightly different twist to the event. The focus, of course, was the lasting effects of Agent Orange on our offspring. As you know, the predictions are that the toxins we were exposed to during our days of the war are, and will continue affecting our children, grandchildren and great grandchildren, possibly for as many as seven generations. The Agent Orange problems will not go away when the last Vietnam vet dies. Our speakers consisted of our own Linda May, who spoke of the health issues of her son Steven who passed away many years ago, Keith King who talked about his daughter Amy and her long struggle with various diseases that are now continuing with his grandchildren, Phil Smith from the Detroit Regional VA Office who gave a brief primer on Agent Orange and what it's all about, and finally Gary Moore, one of the pioneers of the Agent Orange awareness program. The audience seemed to be enthralled with the discussions.

Following the presentations, we opened the floor to questions from the audience. Many people had the opportunity to ask questions about their own family health concerns that might be attributed to Agent Orange. Having the VA service officers there allowed these folks to realize that the doors of opportunity were still open if they had adequate information to file claims. Our State Council President, John Riling, was also in attendance, bringing along an unwanted guest, Agent Orange. The entry of Agent Orange is always a spectacle to behold, and lends a very dramatic air to the entire event.



More than one member said "we really ought to do more of these kind of things." While I agree with the statement, everyone must realize that these things don't just happen. It takes a lot of work on the part of a few people to make sure these things are well planned and come off in the style that Chapter 154 is known for. All it takes is for YOU to step up to the plate and say "I'll do that." I can promise you we'll stand alongside you to make it happen.

Thanks again to Steve Bago for taking on this most worthwhile task and ensuring that it came off without a hitch. All the comments from the attendees reinforce that it was a great meeting. (MORE PHOTOS ON PAGE 8)

Perhaps we should investigate following the process that national uses, where each candidate addresses the membership at the preliminary meetings about what they bring to the table, and what their goals and objectives are for the chapter for the coming year.

A big thank you goes out to those of you who ran for office and didn't get the brass ring this time around. Don't be disheartened, there's always next year. Your willingness to volunteer your services says that you have an interest in the future of this chapter. With the number of

members we have, there is an untapped reservoir of "human capital" that will set the future course of action for this chapter. I applaud the board members, whether outgoing or continuing on, for their support this past year. This has been a truly unique year for us, with a lot of stuff coming at us that is not our usual course of business. There were some heated times but, at the end of the process, we continued moving the chapter forward. That is what we're charged to do. Thank you to the membership who supported the board in making the tough decisions that had to be made.

By the time this newsletter hits your mailbox, two of the important events of spring will be over. The Agent Orange Town Hall Meeting was a huge success, with chairman Steve Bago receiving high praise from national for the panelists he assembled to talk about the fate of our offspring. It was suggested by national that we professionally videotape the entire presentation to use as a teaching aid in the future, and we did that. We will receive copies of the presentation that we can show at the vet center, and also can make available to members who may wish to view it.

The building dedication ceremony took place on April 25, with a large crowd of members and local political figures in attendance. Gary Purcell, along with some chapter members and the Associates, put together a very nice program, and made sure that all the bases were covered to ensure a first-class impression of our chapter was left with everyone. Thanks also to our friends at American House who provided shuttle service between the parking lot and the vet center. They're the best!

Facing us now is "The Wall That Heals," the scaled down replica of the national Vietnam Veterans Memorial that is coming in over **Memorial Day**. Meetings are ongoing and details are being finalized. We are asking for volunteers to work over this holiday to make sure the event goes off without a hitch. Help will be needed for setup/teardown, overnight security of both the memorial and the vehicle display, as well as escorts to assist people in finding names on the memorial. We have been asked to read the 2,654 names of the Michigan KIA/MIAs at the opening ceremony. We will be looking for approximately 35 readers, each reading about 80 names. We are also going to be presented with a flag that was flown over our National Capitol building by Congressman Sander Levin. It is important that we turn out in large numbers to let people know that the Vietnam vets haven't shriveled up and blown away quite yet.

Our memorial is back on the road now, and has a busy summer planned. Consider volunteering some time at one of the stops, not only to help out but to learn what the memorial is all about and see, first hand, the joy that comes from being part of the "wallflowers." I warn you, it becomes addictive.

The annual golf outing is on the calendar – **Saturday, August 29** at Hickory Hollow Golf Course. Dave Schoenherr and Mike Schneider are busily trying to locate sponsors and raffle items, so please get on board early to make sure things don't always have to come down to the wire before the event. Everyone can rest easier if you get aboard early. Unfortunately, my Vietnam reunion has been scheduled in Memphis, Tennessee that same weekend, but that's good news for the outing. People will not be held up while I'm in the woods looking for my ball, so play should go faster. Be proud and stand tall!

AVVA Meeting notes from April 15, 2015

THE WALL THAT HEALS: Wall will arrive Wednesday, May 20 at about 2 p.m. Patriot Guard will escort it in. Thursday, May 21 at 9 a.m. The Wall will be set up. The opening ceremony will be that evening at 6 p.m. From that point till closing Monday, May 25, The Wall will be open for visitation, 24 hours a day.

MEMORIAL DAY: It is currently unclear whether or not we will have a barbecue. There will be more information available at the May meeting.

AGENT ORANGE TOWN HALL MEETING: The event is this Saturday, April 18 at the American House on Common Road. It will probably last a couple of hours. They will be discussing the effects of Agent Orange not only on the vets but on their

They view military service dogs as veterans as does the government. Two dogs will be buried on Saturday. He said that the ceremony is very moving. Other military dogs and their handlers will also be there. The handlers will make the dogs howl during the ceremony as a sign of respect. Boz said that it is a very moving ceremony. The dogs will also have a 21 gun salute.

ELECTIONS: They were held. The new officers are Phyllis Claunch, President; Carole Johnson, Vice President; and Karen Mack, Secretary/Treasurer. Members voted and Cathy Cook and Pat Drdul counted the ballots and verified the results.
