## **This-N-That**

Good evening Jim,

I know this current pandemic, Corona Virus has many going insane, and all have different reasons, but I'd say half of the U.S. population knows keeping social distance and using masks which most if not all retailers are requiring believes this is the right thing to do.

The other half don't believe they need to worry it won't affect them, or find excuses not to wear a mask, or keeping 6 feet from the person ahead of you.

Well I can tell you when it was first announced, Casino's in Las Vegas ignored the warnings and a personal friend of mine for more than 20 years was infected, and within 24 hours was rushed to the hospital where his was allowed to drop him off but not allowed to enter.

For two nearly three months her only communication was with nursing staff and his doctor. After the first week they put him in a coma and on a breathing machine and gave little to no hope and told her to be prepared.

A week later they took him off the drugs to bring him to an alert status, which was a good sign as he was a bit combative, and they put him back in a coma for another week. This time they remove him from the ventilator before he was brought to, and he was still able to breath on his own.

Finally three months later they announced he'd been cured and would go home, but with all the effects he has a visiting nurse daily as well as a physical therapist.

The second person I've known my entire life, he was my "uncle" (adopted of course) and a fellow Marine who served with my dad.

I just found out two weeks ago he passed away from the corona virus.

Bill was the kind of single guy who normally stayed home except to run small errands, so we're not sure where he was infected, could have been the grocery store, farmers market, no one knows, but he didn't stand a chance after being infected as he was also a Vietnam Vet and dealing with his own health issues due to AO exposure.

The rules and guidelines didn't come out till about two months ago and had they come out earlier, both might have been fine.

So when I tell you please wear masks, please keep social distancing, I am more than dead serious! Me personally I have a compromised immune system from Chemo treatments and radiation treatments, I can't and won't take any risks, no matter how many try to convince me it's a waste of time.

Please be safe, please practice the guidelines, don't let your friends or family wake up to your passing!

In the last six months I am pleased to announce that three Homeless Veteran Apartment complexes have been completed and now open for operation. One in Santa Ana, one in Placentia CA, and a third in Boise,

ID. Now granted this doesn't resolve the entire problem, but it's a damn good start!

We just have a few VA Medical Centers with more than enough "excess" property where they could either build mini apartment facilities or do the ground work to install mini homes, either would be suitable to house Homeless Veterans.

Now, my question to everyone. If you call your Rep and both Senators, do you ever mention to them the Homeless Veteran situation? You need to, even if you don't think your member(s) listen. They have to record each call in a call log and those logs are maintained with all the other call logs with Reps and Senators!

On behalf of our Volunteers nationwide and myself, we wish you and your family good health!

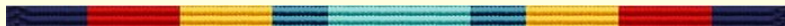


## **Arlington National Cemetery Releases New Education Program**

## **DOD Offers Expanded Child Care Service**

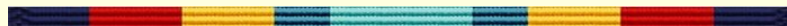

## Complete the Airborne Hazards and Open Burn Pit Registry

All Veterans who served in eligible locations should include their information in the [Airborne Hazards and Open Burn Pits Registry](#). Participation in the registry is very important as it will allow VA to track burn pit exposure and draw inferences regarding associated adverse health effects. Exposure to burn pits may be associated with respiratory conditions such as asthma, emphysema, chronic bronchitis, and chronic obstructive pulmonary disorder (COPD). Recently, VA stated that Veterans with underlying respiratory conditions [may be at greater risk](#) for developing complications related to COVID-19. Service members and Veterans who have already signed up for the registry should make sure that their contact information, phone number, address, and email are up-to-date.

**Veterans Toxic Exposure Bill**

## Introduced

Exposure to toxins, whether herbicides or fumes of chemicals from a burn pit, has long been an issue facing certain service members both at home and abroad. Years of research has produced reports of the debilitating health problems and, in some cases, deaths attributed to exposure to these toxins.

Sen. Thom Tillis (N.C.) recently introduced a comprehensive bill to cover all possible toxicants developed by the TEAM (Toxic Exposure in the American Military) Coalition, which includes FRA, that would address every aspect of this issue. The Toxic Exposure in the American Military Act (TEAM Act S.4393), which would expand access to preventative and diagnostic services for Veterans who were exposed to toxins and also establishes an independent scientific commission tasked with researching the health effects of such toxic exposure and then reporting its findings to the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and Congress. Below is a summary of the provisions of the TEAM Act:

- Provides consultation and testing through the VA for eligible Veterans exposed to toxic substances;
- Requires the VA to respond to new scientific evidence regarding diseases associated with toxic exposure within an established timeframe;

- Establishes a scientific commission to research the health effects of toxic exposure in Veterans and report the commission's findings to the VA and Congress;
- Ensures the VA enters into agreements with the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine to conduct scientific studies regarding the association between diseases and exposure to toxic substances during military service;
- Develops a portal for Veterans to access the Individual Longitudinal Exposure Record;
- Expands training on toxic exposure issues for VA health care and benefits personnel; and
- Requires the VA to develop a questionnaire for primary care appointments to help them determine whether or not a Veteran may have been exposed to toxic substances during their service.

The TEAM Act seeks to standardize and provide fair treatment of service members who were exposed to toxicants. The bill is scheduled for markup in September, please use the [Action Center](#) to ask your Senators to support this important legislation.



## **SVAC Passes legislation**

The Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee held a hearing to consider several legislative proposals

dealing with issues such as mental health, toxic exposure, caring for women and Native American Veterans, helping Veteran-owned small business, among others.

Among the bipartisan bills that were passed, are the FRA-supported Deborah Sampson Act (S.514), which is a comprehensive bill that would assist females who are separating from military service with an emphasis placed on women who suffered service-related sexual trauma; females who are at risk of becoming homeless, and the Agent Orange Exposure Fairness Act, which is similar to an amendment in the must-pass FY2021 NDAA, that is listed on the FRA [Action Center](#). Everyone is encouraged to contact their Senators and weigh in on these and several other issues.

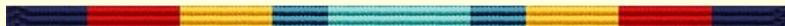

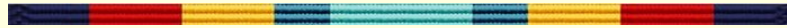

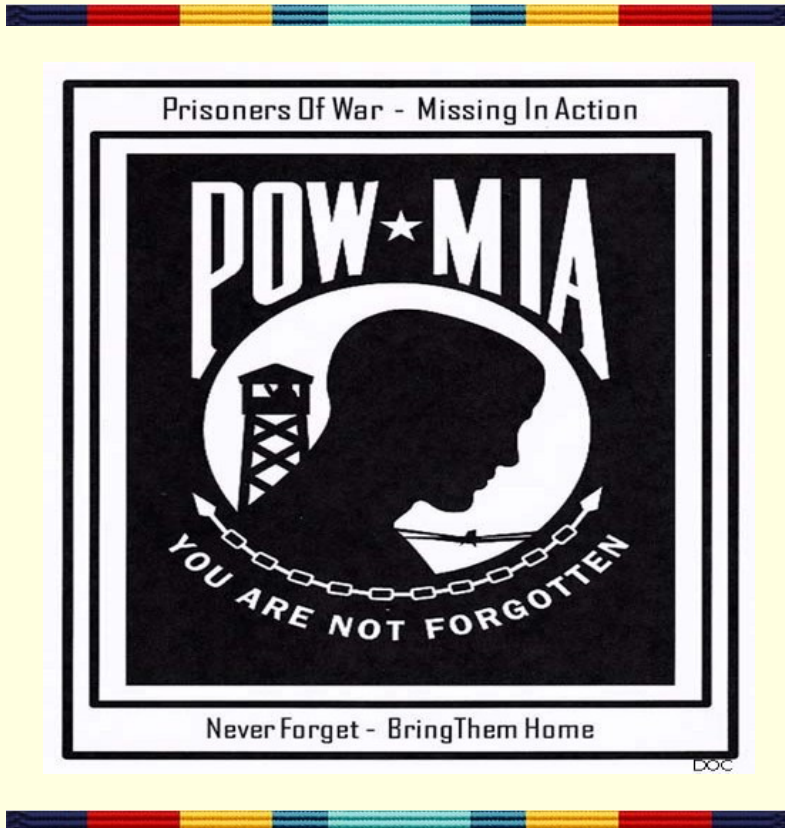
## **Service Secretaries and Branch Chiefs Ask Return of MTFs**

Service Secretaries and Branch Chiefs of each military service have dispatched a memo to Secretary of Defense Mark Esper asking to return all military hospitals and clinics already transferred to the Defense Health Agency (DHA) and the suspension of any planned moves of personnel or resources. The military treatment facilities (MTF) transition to the DHA was required by the FY2017 NDAA (P.L. 114-328), as a result, the services have already handed over many of their facilities.

The DHA assumed management responsibilities from the services for all military hospitals and clinics, which was initiated to provide a more flexible, adaptable, effective and integrated system to manage the facilities. According to the memo, the COVID-19 outbreak has demonstrated that the reform introduced barriers, created unnecessary complexity, and increased inefficiency and costs. The memo also

requests the Department of Defense (DoD) to halt any further transfer of personnel or resources from the services to the DHA.

The DoD will continue with the transition as prescribed by the law. As part of the transition, the DoD initiated closures of some MTFs, which excludes retirees and military dependents access to MTF and made cuts to medical billets. The FRA strongly opposes the closing, restrictions and cuts to billets at MTFs, even before the COVID-19 pandemic. Everyone is urged to use the FRA [Action Center](#) to contact their legislators to halt the MTF restrictions and cutting of billets.

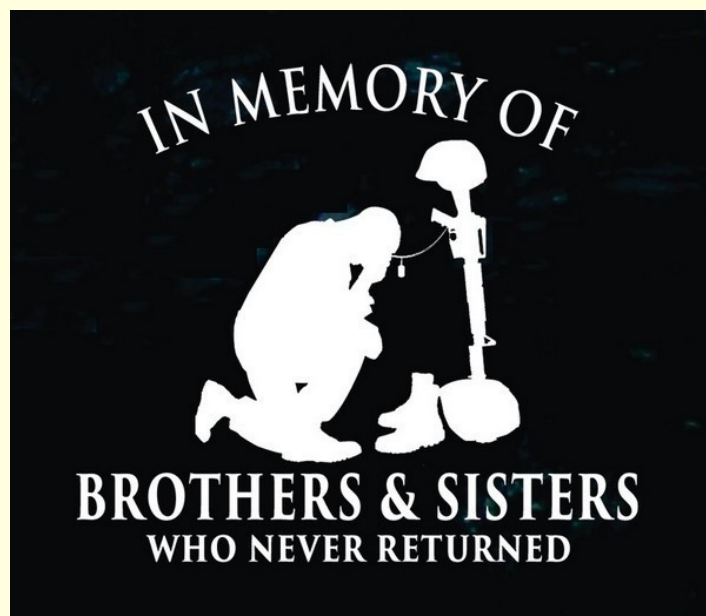

## **Adaptive Housing Bill Becomes Law**

This week, the president signed into law VFW-supported H.R. 3504, the Ryan Kules and Paul Benne Specially Adaptive Housing Improvement Act of 2019. The new law will provide enhancements to VA's Specially Adapted Housing program by increasing the number of grants awarded, raising the dollar amount of the individual grants, and expanding the number of times qualified Veterans can use a housing grant. This change will help certain severely disabled Veterans purchase adaptive homes or upgrade existing homes to meet their specific needs for daily living activities. The VFW applauds the passage of this important bill which will greatly benefit Veterans.



**Keeping History Alive**

read the histories of my ancestry, I am grateful I can count my blessings for all the gifts of freedom I have, I am grateful for the sense of history that gives me perspective for today and tomorrow.

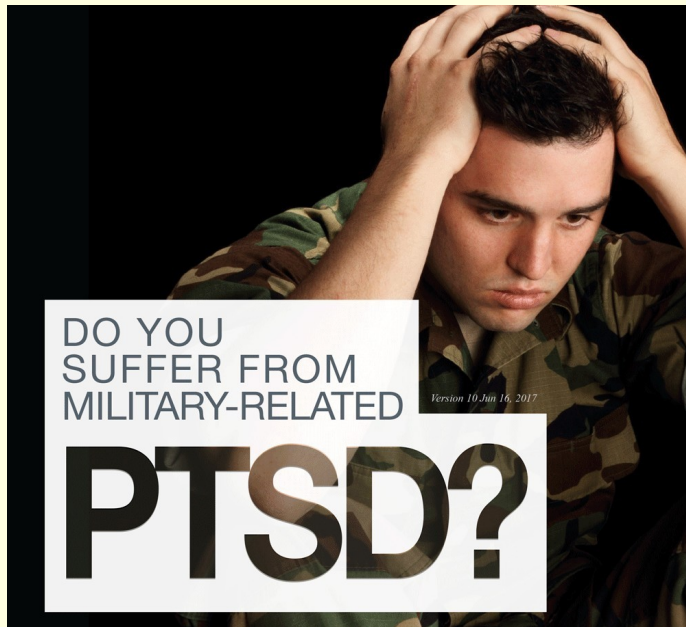

The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency announced one new identification and one burial update for service members who have been missing and unaccounted-for from WWII and the Korean War. Returning home for burial with full military honors are:

**Marine Corps Reserve Pfc. Charles D. Miller**, 19, of Albany, Indiana, was a member of Company A, 1st Battalion, 6th Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, which landed against stiff Japanese resistance on the small island of Betio in the Tarawa Atoll of the Gilbert

Islands, in an attempt to secure the island. Over several days of intense fighting at Tarawa, approximately 1,000 Marines and sailors were killed and more than 2,000 were wounded, while the Japanese were virtually annihilated. Miller died on the third day of battle, Nov. 22, 1943. Miller will be buried at Arlington National Cemetery in Arlington, Virginia. The date has yet to be determined. [Read about Miller.](#)

**Army Sgt. James N. Stryker**, 20, was a member of Company L, 3rd Battalion, 23rd Infantry Regiment, 2nd Infantry Division. He was reported missing in action on May 18, 1951, when the enemy attacked his unit near Han'gye, South Korea. His remains could not be immediately recovered, but he was not officially declared dead until after the Armistice was signed July 27, 1953. Interment services are pending. [Read about Stryker.](#)
