

Shutdown Not Affecting TRICARE Despite Missed Payments

This week the Defense Health Agency (DHA) stated that as a result of the partial government shutdown, allotments used by some TRICARE patients to pay enrollment fees and dental premiums had not been processed through the U.S. Coast Guard pay center. DHA has since released guidance to members of the U.S. Coast Guard, U.S. Public Health Service, the commissioned corps of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Agency, family members, and survivors assuring them that any beneficiary who falls into the aforementioned categories that pays through allotment won't be disenrolled for nonpayment, and that no action is required at this time. TRICARE is not impacted by the shutdown and will continue to process claims. Learn more **here**.

Department of Veterans Affairs Secretary Robert Wilkie called on a federal union Monday to apologize for a chapter president's suggestion that veterans affected by the partial government shutdown might resort to suicide. "The notion that most veterans are so fragile from their service that the slightest hint of hardship can push them to the brink of mental breakdown or even self-harm is preposterous," Wilkie said in his letter to J. CBO suggests raising Tricare fees, cutting veteran benefits to slash deficit

With the federal deficit expected to top \$1 trillion this year, the Congressional Budget Office in December published a list of options for reducing the imbalance over the next 10 years, including three suggestions on Tricare and six that address veterans benefits. In its Options for Reducing the Deficit: 2019 to 2028, the CBO laid out 121 opportunities for curtailing spending and raising revenue. These include raising Tricare enrollment fees for military retirees, instituting enrollment fees for Tricare for Life and reducing veterans benefits. The publication marks the fourth time in five years that the CBO has suggested raising Tricare enrollment fees for working-age retirees and introducing minimum out-of-pocket expenses for those using Tricare for Life. **READ MORE**





Mil Money: Here's how you can get the most out of the new military retirement system For service members who are in the new Blended Retirement System, the Defense Department will contribute up to 5 percent to your retirement account, assuming you contribute 5 percent of your basic pay. 


Burn Pit Legislation Introduced

VA shuns medical marijuana, leaving veterans to improvise

A recent survey suggests that nearly 1 million veterans may be using medical marijuana to treat pain, anxiety and symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder. But with the Department of Veterans Affairs steadfast in its opposition to medical marijuana, doctors in the veterans' health system say the department's lack of research has left them without much good advice to give veterans. "We have a disconnect in care," said Marcel Bonn-Miller, a psychologist who worked for years at the veterans' hospital in Palo Alto, California, and now teaches at the University of Pennsylvania medical school. "The VA has funded lots of marijuana studies, but not of therapeutic potential. All the work has been related to problems of use." **READ MORE**

This doctor is getting great results treating PTSD with lasers

Dr. Robert Kraft and his staff in California have pressed an experimental treatment, transcranial laser treatments, into tackling post-traumatic stress disorder and TBI, and they're already getting great results with veterans and victims of sexual trauma. Now, they want to spread the word and hopefully get the treatment adopted across a wider area, allowing more vets and PTSD sufferers to benefit. As Kraft explains in so many words, the light from high-dose lasers hits the nerves, the nerves use that energy to release chemicals that help brain cells heal and regrow, and the brain can actually repair some damage to itself, whether the original trauma was emotional or physical. It could help heal damage from both PTSD and TBI. **READ MORE**

Women and minority veterans are thriving in the civilian workforce

Bureau of Labor Statistics figures show the annual unemployment rate for women veterans was 3 percent last year — the lowest unemployment rate on record for this group in the 21st century — while male veterans had an unemployment rate of 3.5 percent. Among post-9/11 veterans in particular, women again outshined men with a 3.5 percent unemployment rate, compared to 3.9. Breakdowns by race and ethnicity showed similar trends. **READ MORE**

Tricare Emergency in Florida

If you have been evacuated from certain counties in Florida, you may not have to get a referral from your primary care manager to see a Tricare authorized provider. This is also known as a blanket referral waiver. This applies to anyone in a Tricare Prime plan in the following counties: Bay, Calhoun, Franklin, Gulf, Jackson, Liberty, and Washington Counties until January 31, 2019. To obtain care, (1) Find a Tricareauthorized provider in the area where you are evacuated to schedule an appointment. and (2) contact the military hospital or clinic by phone to ensure it is open before you travel to the facility.

VA Offers New Ultrasound Device

Clinicians who are experts in Point of Care Ultrasonography (POCUS) are in awe of a new ultraportable ultrasound device, the Butterfly IQ. The Butterfly's first use in the United States was at VA NY Harbor Healthcare System and at NYU Langone. It is a very lightweight probe that looks like a sleek black electric razor. It plugs into an iPhone. The device screens heart, lungs, veins of the legs and other parts of the body. Veterans claiming illness from burn pits lose court fight

A decade-long fight ended at the Supreme Court when justices refused to hear an appeal by veterans of Iraq and Afghanistan who say that toxic smoke from burn pits made them sick. Hundreds of those veterans had sued the military contracting giant KBR, Inc., but lost first in U.S. district court and then again last year in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 4th Circuit. The 4th Circuit said KBR was under U.S. military direction when it burned tires and medical waste next to soldiers' barracks, and can't be held liable. "America has turned its back on its war heroes. It's disgusting," said Rosie Torres, whose husband Leroy was a plaintiff in the case. **READ MORE**

Get Flu Shots for Free

Did you get your flu shot? If not, it is not too late. You and your family can get the flu shot at no cost at a military hospital or clinic, a participating network pharmacy, or from a Tricare-authorized provider. The flu vaccine, when given by a pharmacist at a network pharmacy, is covered by the pharmacy benefit for free. You can still go to your primary care manager or Tricare provider for the flu shot if the pharmacy has restrictions or the shot is not available. VA Million Veteran Program Tops 725,000 Enrollees

The results of most nationwide opinion surveys are based on just a few thousand respondents. The VA's Million Veteran Program is different, and that's why they want to enroll 1 million veterans to help researchers understand what illnesses might be associated with where and when veterans served. The goal of the **voluntary** research program is to partner with VA-enrolled veterans to study how genes affect health by safely collecting and storing blood samples and health information. Food stamp programs to remain available through February for troops, Veterans

Agriculture Department funding expired Dec. 21 with the onset of the shutdown, but officials have announced that full benefits for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program will continue through February. Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue said stopgap ways had been found to appropriate money for the SNAP and child nutrition programs under budgeting authorities that remained from a previous continuing resolution passed by Congress. VA Renews Opposition to Agent Orange Benefits for Blue Water Vets

The Department of Veterans Affairs shows no signs of backing off opposition to extending Agent Orange health care and benefits to "Blue Water Navy" Vietnam veterans, setting up another major battle this year with veterans groups and overwhelming majorities in the House and Senate. How the Government Shutdown Impacts Tricare

The partial government shutdown that began Dec. 22, 2018, affected allotments used by some Tricare patients to pay enrollment fees and dental premiums. Tricare is not able to process these payments made through the U.S. Coast Guard pay center. However, Tricare will continue to cover patients. You do not need to take action at this time. This affects Tricare health plans and Tricare Dental Program allotments made on or after Jan. 1, 2019 by: (1) retirees of the U.S. Coast Guard, U.S. Public Health Service, and commissioned corps of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Agency; and (2) their family members, survivors, and eligible former spouses. MIA Update

This week, the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency announced four new identifications. Returning home with full military honors are:

Naval Reserve Lt. Richard C. Lannom was a bombardier-navigator aboard an A-6A Intruder assigned to Attack Squadron Three Five, USS Enterprise. On March 1, 1968, during a night strike mission over North Vietnam, contact with Lannom's aircraft was lost and his plane did not return to the ship. An extensive search was conducted with negative results. Based on this information, Lannom and his pilot were declared missing in action. Interment services are pending. Read about Lannom.

Army Air Forces Sgt. John Kalausich was a

member of the 642nd Bombardment Squadron, 409th Bombardment Group, 9th Bombardment Division, 9th Air Force. On March 21, 1945, Kalausich was aboard an A-26B when it was hit by anti-aircraft fire and went missing during a combat mission from Couvron, France, to Dülmen, Germany. Kalausich's aircraft had been participating in the interdiction campaign to obstruct German troop movements in preparation for the Allied crossing of the Rhine River on March 23, 1945. Interment services are pending. Read about Kalausich.

Army Air Forces Sgt. Vernon L. Hamilton was a member of the 642nd Bombardment Squadron, 409th Bombardment Group, 9th Bombardment Division, 9th Air Force. On March 21, 1945, Hamilton was aboard an A-26B when it was hit by anti-aircraft fire and went missing during a combat mission from Couvron, France, to Dülmen, Germany. Hamilton's aircraft had been participating in the interdiction campaign to obstruct German troop movements in preparation for the Allied crossing of the Rhine River on March 23, 1945. Interment services are pending. Read about Hamilton.

Navy Fireman 1st Class Grant C. Cook was stationed aboard the USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft on Dec. 7, 1941. The battleship sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Cook. Interment services are pending. Read about Cook.
